Overview of Project:

The primary objective is to equip faculty members and staff with the skills to recognize and respond to early signs of mental health challenges among students, fostering a more supportive and proactive environment on our campus. To achieve this, we will conduct comprehensive MHFA training workshops focused on mental health awareness, crisis intervention, and referral processes. Participants will be assessed through surveys to measure improvements in confidence and preparedness to handle mental health situations. By empowering faculty and staff as mental health advocates, we wish to reduce stigma, promote well-being, and improve students' overall academic and personal outcomes, contributing to a healthier and more inclusive campus community.
